 SUPPLEMENT TO Dead Body COMPLAINT # 97-11829

At 0700 hrs, 10-24-97, myself and Deputies Montgomery #274 and Ebert #66 were sitting at the entrance to Highland Cemetery when we were contacted by MR. Robert Witbols Feugen, the father of Anastasia E. Witbols Feugen, Homicide victim, reference report #97-11829. MR. Witbols Feugen had drove up in a Blue Four door Chevrolet Corvica with damage to the front quarter panel on the drivers side. MR. Witbols Feugen approached me and identified himself as "The Father of the murder victim found in Lincoln cemetery" and wanted to know if Highland Cemetery was Lincoln cemetery. I advised MR. Witbols Feugen that Lincoln cemetery was North of Truman on the west side of Blue Ridge, and he advised that he had never been there. MR. Witbols Feugen then requested that I take him to the place where the body of his daughter was found, and I told him to contact the detective unit for a possible escort. MR. Witbols Feugen then began talking about events prior to his daughters death and advised the following: That his daughter had been emotionally disturbed for the last several months and talked of suicide but had never acted on it. HE described his daughter as "Frisky" and that she would have never been killed without a struggle, and that she would die before ever letting anyone "mess with her," HE stated that her boyfriend was not the violent type, and he did not believe that he would kill her. HE further stated that the boyfriend had been in contact with him on 10-22-97, at approximately 2200 hrs, and stated that he and Anastasia had been involved in a verbal argument in his vehicle at a stop light at Truman & I-435. The boyfriend told him that Anastasia got out of his vehicle and began walking. The boyfriend then left her and went home. MR. Witbols Feugen stated he believed a stranger had picked her up and told her that they would go to a interesting place, a cemetery,

and after getting to the cemetery the stranger shot her. MR. Witbols Feugen stated during the conversation that he had dropped his daughter off at the west entrance to Mt. Washington Cemetery on Truman Rd, at 1630 hrs, 10-22-97, with her friends, and that she apparently met up with her boy friend later in the evening. MR. Witbols Feugen stated although he believed Anastasia's boy friend did not kill his daughter he thought it was peculiar that he was missing on this date. MR. Witbols Feugen kept his composure throughout our conversation and continued making references to the crime scene stating "I hope they got all of the evidence and did not miss something." At the end of the conversation MR. Witbols Feugen stated that he was going to Lincoln Cemetery on his own and that he would probably just "walk the cemetery with his hand on the wall thinking about my daughter."

MR. Witbols Feugen then left north bound on Blue Ridge.

After approximately two minutes, (after MR. Witbols Feugen left) myself and Depolies Montgomery and Ebert decided that we should go to Lincoln Cemetery and check the well being of MR. Witbols Feugen, due to the traumatic experience of losing his daughter and being alone in the area of her demise. We then went to Lincoln Cemetery and found MR. Witbols Feugen's vehicle parked facing westbound on the north side of the access road at the entrance to Lincoln Cemetery off of Blue Ridge. I immediately observed that the vehicle was abandoned and proceeded westbound on the access road in search of MR. Witbols Feugen. Upon approaching the circle drive I observed MR. Witbols Feugen to be standing with his hands on his hips standing directly over the exact location where I had found

ANASTASIA'S body on 10-23-97, MR. WITBOLS FEUGEN WAS looking at the ground for approximately five seconds before turning around and seeing me. Upon seeing me he appeared startled and turned around walking very quickly towards my police vehicle with his left hand tucked firmly in his pocket. MR. WITBOLS FEUGEN approached me and asked "Am I close" referring to where the body was found. I again advised MR. WITBOLS FEUGEN that he should contact the detective unit for specific information and he spontaneously stated "What are you guys doing following me I'm not the bad guy you guys should be out looking for the bad guy!" I then attempted to calm him down by advising him that we were there to check his wellbeing and that we planned to do all we could to bring closure to his grief. MR. WITBOLS FEUGEN then began advising the following information: At 2330 hrs, 10-22-97, he was looking for ANASTASIA when he stopped at the Gate of Mount Washington Cemetery (where he had dropped her off at 1630 hrs, this date, with her friends). HE stated that the gate was locked and he pondered for a moment, hopping the fence, to go into the cemetery searching for his daughter because he sensed she was in real danger. At that time he advised he heard a loud gun shot, possibly from a large caliber rifle, and he immediately turned in the direction of the Cimarron Apartments, believing the noise came from that direction. MR. WITBOLS FEUGEN stated at that time he clapped his hands together and yelled "boom" "There goes the neighborhood." MR. WITBOLS FEUGEN then stated "At that time I knew my daughter was dead." HE stated he then began driving back and forth on Truman Road searching for his daughter but never checked Lincoln Cemetery.

I observed Mr. Withols Feugen's demeanor to change when he began talking about the gun shot and described his actions upon hearing the gunshot. HE appeared to switch from grieving parent to excited and colorful, describing in detail his emotion upon hearing the gun shot.

I then reassured Mr. Withols Feugen that we were doing everything to solve the case and advised him that he needed to contact the Sheriff's Dept should he remember any further information pertinent to the case. I then began leaving the area and observed him to walk away from the area where the body was located. E.O.R.
